ecocriticism explores the ways in which we imagine and portray the relationship between humans and the environment across many areas of cultural production including romantic poetry wildlife documentaries climate models the hollywood blockbuster the day

the oxford handbook of ecocriticism provides a broad survey of the longstanding relationship between literature and the environment the moment for such an offering is opportune in many respects multiple environmental crises are increasingly inescapable at both transnational and local levels the role of the humanities in addition to technology and politics is increasingly recognized as central for exploring and finding solutions and the subject of ecocriticism has reached a kind of critical mass both within its anglo american heartlands and beyond from its origins in the study of american nature writing and british romanticism ecocriticism has developed along numerous theoretical historical cultural and geographical axes the most contemporary and exciting of which will be represented in the handbook the contributors include eminent founders of the field including michael branch and richard

developing an innovative model for climate change mitigation and adaptation this book translates feminist theory into practice bringing together climate justice and community engagement to demonstrate how we can gradually change the world as the world changes us

exploring what can be learnt when literary critics in the field of animal studies temporarily direct attention away from representations of nonhuman animals in literature and towards liminal figures like androids aliens and ghosts this book examines the boundaries of humanness simultaneously it encourages the reader both to see nonhuman animals afresh and to reimagine the terms of our relationships with them examining imaginative texts by writers such as octavia butler philip k dick kazuo ishiguro jeanette winterson and j m coetzee this book looks at depictions of androids that redefine traditional humanist qualities such as hope and uniqueness it examines alien visions that unmask the racist and heteronormative roots of speciesism and it unpacks examples of ghosts and spirits who offer posthumous visions of having been human that decenter anthropocentrism in doing so it leaves open the potential for better relationships and futures with nonhuman animals

this element presents a necessary intervention within the rapidly expanding field of research in the environmental humanities on climate change and environmental literacy in contrast to the dominant science centred literacy debates which largely ignore the unique resources of the humanities it asks how does literary reading contribute to climate change communication how does this contribution relate to recent demands for environmental and

related literacies rather than reducing the function of literature to a more pleasurable form of information transfer or its affective dimension of evoking sympathy climate change literacy thoroughly reassesses the cognitive affective and pedagogic potentials of literary writing it does so by analysing a selection of popular climate novels and by demonstrating the role of fiction in fostering a more adequate understanding of and response to climate change this title is also available as open access on cambridge core

the concept of framing has long intrigued and troubled scholars in fields including philosophy rhetoric media studies and literary criticism but framing also has rich implications for environmental debate urging us to reconsider how we understand the relationship between humans and their ecological environment culture and nature the contributors to this wide ranging volume use the concept of framing to engage with key questions in environmental literature history politics film tv and pedagogy in so doing they show that framing can serve as a valuable analytical tool connecting different academic discourses within the emergent interdisciplinary field of the environmental humanities no less importantly they demonstrate how increased awareness of framing strategies and framing effects can help us move society in a more sustainable direction

examining a wide variety of poets from the last three decades of the 20th century to the present from asian african south american and settler colonies such as canada and australia this book maps an ecopoetics of vulnerability and resilience while environmental fiction has been widely studied ecopoetry has not received the same level of attention this book studies the work of over 50 poets from the global south and the formerly colonized including john kinsella tanure ojaide linda hogan kofi awonoor okot p bitek

ben okri and sherwin bitsui it traces an ecological consciousness that cuts across human and nonhuman living and non living domains it is interested in the making unmaking and remaking of worlds and meanings in the age of cataclysmic climate shifts while aware of the histories that fashioned the planet in unjust and unequal ways and to which the poets bear witness as well as propose alternative ways of seeing and meaning making

special focus omission edited by patrick gill throughout literary history and in many cultures we encounter an astute use of conspicuous absences to conjure an imagined reality into a recipient's mind the term omission as used in the present study then demarcates a common artistic phenomenon a silence blank or absence introduced against the recipient's generic or experiential expectations but which nonetheless frequently encapsulates the tenor of the work as a whole such omissions can be employed for their affective potential when emotions represented or evoked by the text are deemed to be beyond words they can be employed to raise epistemological questions as when an omission marks the limits of what can be known ethical questions can also be approached by means of omissions as when a character's voice is omitted for instance finally omission always carries within it the potential to reflect on the media and genres on which it is brought to bear as its efficacy depends on the recipient's generic expectations omission is frequently characterized by a high degree of meta discursiveness this volume investigates the various strategies with which the phenomenon of omission is employed across a range of textual forms and in different cultures to conclusively argue for its status as a highly effective and near universal form of artistic signification

exploring a variety of environmental concerns and surveying a wide range of contemporary poetry fiction and memoir by women writers this book argues for the centrality of individual encounter and fragmentary form in twenty first century literature in accounts of both solitude and community these texts find new ways to respond to the present in the absence of explanatory narratives the work considered here provides new ways to consider questions of attention care and loss rather than emphasising planetary change they highlight the role of individual agency and enmeshment in a more than human world proposing a new model of gleaning to encompass ideas of collection assemblage and relinquishment this book moves from accounts of individual encounters to collective care and considers questions of the archive classification systems performance and storytelling in doing so it highlights the way fragmentary texts can be seen as a mode of resistance including analyses of works by both familiar and emerging writers including sara baume ali smith elizabeth jane burnett bhanu kapil kathleen jamie and many others this book also draws on theoretical perspectives such as ecofeminism new materialism posthumanism and affect theory

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
